Exhibits I and II reflect the Organization's activities for the year, and Exhibit III shows the financial position of the Organization as of 31 December 1962. Exhibit IV is a consolidated statement of income and expenditure according to fund.

Exhibits V through IX present statements of a similar nature covering funds administered for INCAP and OAS/TCP.

In addition to the Financial Report, there is presented, as an informational annex, a summary and distribution of expenditure. This summary comprises three tables, one showing the activities under all sources of funds by object of expenditure, a second showing PAHO Regular Funds by budget part and object of expenditure, and a third table giving expenditure for all sources of funds by budget part and by individual project.

#### Financial Activities in 1962

The following table presents a summary of the combined expenditures relating to activities of the Pan American Health Organization and the World Health Organization in the year 1962. This table relates only to activities in the Americas and does not reflect disbursement of funds on behalf of other offices principally WHO Headquarters and other Regional Offices, for whom an amount of over \$975,000.00 was disbursed, principally in connection with payments for WHO fellows and for procurement of supplies and equipment.

#### Budget Income

Total income, as shown in Exhibit II amounted to \$4,462,608 comprising quota contributions of \$4,324,885 and \$137,723 in other income. Quota contributions both current and arrears were only 83.3 per cent of the assessed budget and, as shown in Table A, the level of total income reached only 85.1 per cent of the authorized budget. This was lower than in any previous year.

In recent years quota receipts have fluctuated on a two year cycle. Although 1962 was a low swing in the cycle, the difference was much greater than expected, the amount received being inadequate to maintain the program of the Organization at the planned level. A most serious aspect of this problem relates to Member Governments which are more than one year in arrears.

#### Budgetary Expenditure

It will be noted in Exhibit I that total obligations incurred for 1962 were \$4,751,018. This is \$488,982 below the authorized budget, but \$288,410above the income level. As the prospect of a low level of receipts became apparent during the course of the year, every effort was made to economize in the operation of the Organization; program activities were reduced or postponed where possible. It was necessary, however, to meet the increased costs of a new salary schedule approved by the United Nations General Assembly and adopted by PAHO in accordance with the established policy of following WHO and the U.N. salary system. The Executive Committee approved the utilization of funds from Part V, Amount for Increasing the Working Capital Fund, to meet the new salary scale. This additional requirement for funds, coupled with the unusually low level of quota receipts, left no funds available at all for Part V and thus resulted in a suspension during 1962 of the plan for increasing the Working Capital Fund.

Expenditure under Part IV, the Special Fund for Health Promotion, which was budgeted in 1962 for the first time, appears in Exhibit I. The amount of \$187,500 represents program activities in water supply, nutrition and education which, under an agreement with the W. K. Kellogg Foundation, constitute payment of the first annual installment on the generous loan toward construction of the headquarters building. Following an increase in the loan toward the end of 1962 the annual installment will be \$250,000 commencing in 1963.

#### Financial Situation and the Working Capital Fund

In 1962 the Organization suffered a setback in its twofold plan for achieving a high level of financial stability. As explained in the previous Financial Report, O.D. 39, the Director has adopted a policy of prudent management to keep the average of budgetary expenditures within the average income. The second major element of this fiscal policy is to increase the Working Capital Fund by means of an amount budgeted for this purpose. In Table A it will be noted that the total expenditures for the five year period exceeded the total receipts by \$106,492. It will, therefore, be necessary in 1963 and future years to hold expenditures below receipts until they are again in balance.

In 1963 and future years the amount budgeted for the Working Capital Fund will be given highest priority to assure its availability for this purpose. Table B reflects the status of the Working Capital Fund over a period of years. In 1961 an upward trend was started with the first budgeted amount for increasing the Fund. This trend will continue in 1963 and future years.

Another aspect of financial soundness relates to activities financed with funds made available through grants and voluntary contributions outside the regular budget. A review was made of requirements to meet the cost of terminal entitlements of staff upon cessation of a continuing grant or voluntary contribution. As a consequence, action has been started to augment the existing reserves which include repatriation grants and service benefits to provide also for entitlements relating to payment for accrued annual leave and the cost of repatriation transportation. It is believed that in time this reserve will assure the Organization's capacity to meet future financial obligations of this nature without danger to the regular budget or the Working Capital Fund.

#### Capital Assets

The amount of \$538,045 represents the recorded book value of land and buildings of the Headquarters of the Pan American Health Organization in Washington, D. C. and Zone Office in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

#### Unliquidated Obligations

Unliquidated obligations amounting to \$496,310 represent the estimated amount required to liquidated outstanding liabilities pertaining to 1962 Budget and Special Funds. Included in this amount is \$60,336, the outstanding balance of 1962 fellowship awards. The other principal items are travel and supplies and equipment.

Fellowship balances of \$16,289 brought forward into 1963 relate to 1961 fellowships awards not fulfilled by 31 December 1962.

#### Accrued Service Benefit, Termination and Repatriation Entitlements

Under the Staff Rules terminating staff members are entitled to certain terminal payments, such as payment for unused leave, service benefit allowances, cost of repatriation, etc. For some years, the Bureau has followed the policy of setting aside funds to partially cover these costs. Starting in 1962, this accrual has been expanded to provide eventually for complete coverage of terminal costs for those activities not financed from the regular PAHO budget.

#### Insurance Equalization Account

This account has been established in order to distribute evenly the expenses for various types of insurance over a period of years. An amount of \$8,500 was charged to the 1962 budget of the Organization and credited to this account.

#### Building Fund

During 1962 this fund was increased by \$6,628, representing interest earned on investments. Expenditures for architectural fees, topographic surveys, etc. totalling \$113,410 were effected leaving a balance of \$165,286 as at year end.

#### Trust Funds

Trust funds fall into two groups, namely Grants and Contributions, as shown on Schedule 7.

REPORT OF THE EXTERNAL AUDITOR ON THE AUDIT OF THE ACCOUNTS OF THE PAN AMERICAN HEALTH ORGANIZATION FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 1962

### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 The audit of the accounts of the Pan American Health Organization for the financial year 1962 has been carried out in accordance with the terms of my appointment as the External Auditor and Article XII of the Financial Regulations of the Organization.
- 1.2 There has been no material change in either the scope or the character of the audit compared with those of earlier years. Transactions, accounts and inventories were examined to the extent necessary to satisfy myself as to the correctness of the accounts. I have also examined the reports of the internal auditors and have been able to review their work which has given me complete satisfaction.
- 1.3 With regard to the audit of the 1962 accounts and its result, I wish to state specifically that to my knowledge there have been no cases of fraud or presumptive fraud. The financial transactions have been carried out in conformity with the rules, regulations and policies of the Organization. I consider that the management of the different funds of the Organization has been good.
- 1.4 I have certified the correctness of the following financial statements relating to the Pan American Health Organization which have been transmitted to me by the Director:

Statement of Appropriations, Obligations and Balances for the year 1962 (Exhibit I);

Statement of Income and Expenditure for the 1962 Budget (Exhibit II);

Statement of Assets and Liabilities as of 31 December 1962 (Exhibit III);

Consolidated Statement of Income and Expenditure for the financial year 1962 and Status of Funds as of 31 December 1962 (Exhibit IV); and the following statements relating to the Institute of Nutrition of Central America and Panama which is administered by the Pan American Sanitary Bureau, viz: Statement of Appropriations, Obligations and Balances for the year 1962 (Exhibit V); Statement of Income and Expenditure for the 1962 Budget (Exhibit VI); Statement of Assets and Liabilities as of 31 December 1962 (Exhibit VII); and the following statements concerning the Organization of

and the following statements concerning the Organization of American States Program of Technical Cooperation which is administered by the Pan American Health Organization:

Statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended 31 December 1962 (Exhibit VIII);

Statement of Assets and Liabilities as of 31 December 1962 (Exhibit IX).

### 2. Budgetary Expenditure

- 2.1 An amount of \$4,751,018 has been obligated against the total appropriated budget of \$5,240,000, leaving an unobligated balance of \$488,982. In the year 1961 the corresponding unobligated figure was \$108,255.
- 2.2 The budgetary expenditure for 1962 compared with those of the two preceding years was as follows:

- 2.3 Expenditure against the 1962 budget reveals a somewhat anomalous situation. Whereas comparison with expenditure incurred during 1961 shows an increase in Part I and Part II both in amount and as a percentage of the total budgetary expenditure the opposite is the case in Part III. The percentage changes and the main reasons therefore are outlined as follows:
  - Part I Increase of 3 per cent.in the share of the total budgetary expenditure mainly due to the heavy cash outlay involved in holding the XVI Pan American Sanitary Conference in Minneapolis rather than in Buenos Aires as planned.
  - Part II Increase of 6 per cent. in the share of the total budgetary expenditure mainly due to the introduction of the new professional salary scale and allowances.

- Part III Decrease of 6 per cent. in the share of the total budgetary expenditure mainly due to the cut-back of the program as the result of poor collections of contributions.
- Part V Decrease of 7 per cent. in the share of the total budgetary expenditure due to poor collections of contributions. Even without any transfer to the Working Capital Fund there is a deficit, as mentioned later in my report. It is therefore evident that the Organization has not the money available to make any transfer to the Working Capital Fund as was intended. Consequently, as can be seen from Exhibit I the proposed transfer of \$300,000 has not taken place, and has instead been shown as an "unobligated balance expired". Such was the financial situation of the Organization in 1962.
- 2.4 In 1962 the Executive Committee approved that \$294,283 should be transferred from Part V to Parts I, II and III in order to meet the expenditure connected with the new scale of salaries and allowances. In view of the financial situation this approval was not implemented, and in order to meet the increased expenditure under Part I and II the Director transferred \$256,327 from Part III to Parts I and II.

### 3. Budgetary Income

3.1 Revenues during 1962 compared with those of 1961 and 1960, were as follows:

- 3.2 The total budgetary income for 1962 is \$777,392 lower than the authorized budget. In 1961 the income was \$155,619 higher than the authorized budget. The bad result in 1962 is entirely due to the non-payment of contributions.
- 3.3 The following table shows the collection of contributions for the last five years:

With the exception of 1960 the percentage of contributions collected in 1962 is the lowest of the last twelve years i.e. since the budget reached a level of two million dollars.

- 3.4 It should be noted that, of the 76.66 per cent. of current quotas, one Member State has paid 66 per cent. and the other Members together only 10.66 per cent. of the assessed contributions. In fact, of the twenty one Member States only five paid their quotas for 1962 in full, in spite of the efforts made by the Headquarters officials and the Zone Representatives. 1/
- 3.5 Arrears were collected in 1962 totalling \$348,550 against \$836,532 in 1961. During 1962 the total of uncollected arrears increased by \$851,216. The increase in the arrears during the last five years amounted to \$1,726,081 as can be seen from the following table: <u>1</u>/

- It should be noted that the arrears must first be paid before collections of contributions for the current year are credited to the income budget, and it is obvious that unless the collection situation improves the only way for the Bureau to operate on a sound financial basis will be to reduce the budgeted activities drastically.
- 3.7 As indicated in the following table the purchases on behalf of government administrations and public institutions have doubled during 1962, with a corresponding increase in the 3% procurement charge income. The income increased by \$3,539 over the 1961 figure, compared with a decrease in 1961 of \$5,897 over the 1960 figure.

3.8 Procurement charges are made only on purchases for government administrations and public institutions and only on the net purchase price, excluding freight, loading, insurance cost, etc. Procurement in connection with the field activities or of the Organization itself, or on behalf of the World Health Organization are not included in the above table. 3.9 As can be seen from paragraph 12 below \$9,794 have been written off. There are still three small amounts due to the Bureau, totalling \$74, due to costs slightly in excess of estimates. It is understood that action is being taken to collect these amounts.

### 4. Deficit

In 1962 there was a deficit (i.e. the difference between the obligations incurred and the budgetary income in cash) amounting to \$288,410 as can be seen from Exhibit II. This amount has been covered by a withdrawal from the Working Capital Fund. In 1961 there was a cash surplus of \$263,874 which was transferred to the Working Capital Fund.

### 5. Working Capital Fund

- 5.1 Resolution VII of the XI Meeting of the Directing Council indicated that the Working Capital Fund should gradually increase until the Fund reaches 60 per cent. of the budget level and approved a policy of providing in future budgets an amount for the purpose. Article III, paragraph 103.4 of the Financial Rules of the Pan American Health Organization reads as follows: "Any surplus of funds arising from an excess of income over obligations shall be transferred to the Working Capital Fund".
- 5.2 The Working Capital Fund as at 1 January 1962 amounted to \$1,707,059. It was the intention to increase the Fund to over \$2,000,000 as at 31 December 1962 by the transfer thereto of \$300,000. However, as can be seen from paragraph 2.3 above this transfer could not be made due to the poor collection of contributions. On the contrary, to cover the budgetary deficit in 1962 there was the withdrawal from the Fund of \$288,410 mentioned in paragraph 4 above. As a result the balance of the Fund as at 31 December 1962 was reduced to \$1,418,649 or 27 per cent. of the authorized budget as compared with the 60 per cent. approved by the Directing Council.

### 6. Emergency Procurement Revolving Fund

- 6.1 The Directing Council created at its III Meeting an Emergency Procurement Fund in the amount of \$50,000 in order to provide immediate relief to Member States in cases of unforseen emergency health problems.
- 6.2 In 1962 procurement totalled \$19,933. At 31 December 1962 the cash balance was \$33,999 and claims on Member States totalled \$16,001, of which a claim of \$2,050 had been outstanding since 1961.

7. Building Fund

The balance of the Building Fund as at 1 January 1962 amounted to \$272,068 and was increased by \$6,628 from interest earned. During 1962 expenditure amounted to \$113,410, of which \$106,000 represented a portion of the architects' fees, which will be paid according to the standard contract of 6 per cent. of the total cost of the building.

### 8. Special Malaria Fund

8.1 Starting from 1 January 1957 voluntary contributions to the Special Malaria Fund reached the amount of \$11,509,400 as of 31 December 1962, received from the following countries:

- 10. Reserves for Trust Funds and Grants
  - 10.1 During 1962 the Director decided that financial prudence dictated the necessity of building up over the three years ending 31 December 1964 reserves to cover the cost of repatriation travel, accrued annual leave entitlements and indemnity payments for staff members financed from grants and voluntary contributions.

In consequence thereof an initial sum of \$218,773 has this year been set aside and is made up as follows:

This amount included in the figure of \$410,780 shown under Accrued Termination and Repatriation Entitlements in the Statement of Assets and Liabilities. The balance of \$192,007 represents repatriation grants relating to PASB personnel, and compares with the sum of \$146,604 shown under the heading of Accrued Repatriation Entitlements at 31 December 1961.

10.2 In view of the great difficulty which the PAHO Regular budget would have to pay termination costs of staff which may have to be met after grants or voluntary contributions cease, I commend the decision to build up these reserves. At the same time I would draw attention that savings resulting from over estimates of this reserve should normally revert to the source.

### 11. Losses

11.1 During 1962 items of equipment mentioned below were missing:

The losses of the typewriters have been fully covered by reimbursement from the insurance company. An amount of only \$69 has been recovered in respect of the tape-recorder due to its age. Claim for the loss of the fan has not so far been made.

11.2 The claims for the two missing typewriters in 1961 which I reported on last year have been settled by the insurance company.

### 12. Write-off of Certain Uncollected Procurement Service Receivables

In 1957 the Organization established a \$12,436 Reserve for Doubtful Accounts to cover certain long over-due receivables growing out of Procurement Service transactions dating before September 1951, when the Organization adopted its present advance payment requirement. Since establishment of this Reserve, some \$2,642 has been collected. All further attempts to collect having failed, the Director has authorized, in accordance with Financial Regulation 10.4, writing-off of the balances as follows:

- (i) Ministerio de Salubridad, Bolivia for drugs \$8,664 and medical supplies shipped in 1949.
- (ii) Yellow Fever Service, Brazil for supplies 483 consisting of needles and laboratory containers for use in the yellow fever program in Brazil in 1951.
- (iii) Director General de Salud Pública, Guatemala. 647 This amount has been outstanding since 1951.

- 14. Recentralization of administrative service
  - 14.1 In 1962 some of the administrative work carried out in the Zone Offices has been transferred back to Headquarters and the remaining administrative functions in the Zone Offices will probably be transferred to Washington in 1963.

In connection with the transfer of the administrative work from the Zone Offices to Headquarters, the administrative structure of the Bureau has been streamlined, procedures are being revised, new techniques introduced and changes in the staffing pattern of many units have taken place.

- 14.2 The final savings in the total annual administrative costs are estimated to reach some \$400,000, but I will point out that there will probably be some increase of personnel costs both in the finance and personnel units taking into account the overtime which has been spent in these units during 1962.
- 14.3 The Director will certainly give detailed information concerning all relevant facts appertaining to the recentralization to the Executive Committee of the Directing Council.

### 15. Reflections

It is unnecessary, I think, to make any statement concerning my impressions of the audit of the accounts for 1962, because I have already mentioned them in paragraphs 1.3, 2.3, 3.2, 3.5, 3.6, and 5.3. I am deeply concerned with the bad condition of contributions relating to both arrears and current quotas.

Further study should be given to all possible ways of encouraging and facilitating payment of quotas. Since arrears of two or more years are the most serious, it might be advisable for the Governing Bodies to consider the experience of WHO and other international organizations, including the effect of their constitutional provisions making possible the limitation of privileges and services. Solutions need to be found to assure sound financing for the program.
